This limits SBC's way of communicating information with the public, we are unable to post videos or images on the website currently.</p> <p>The first phase of the Website Refresh is about migrating the website to the more modern 'Jadu Central' platform. This will allow SBC more control, security and functionality.</p> <p>Alongside the migration, there will also be an integration between 'Community Central' and Brightly Confirm, allowing efficiencies in the Highway and Streets services.</p>

	<p>This phase of work is part of a larger programme to update the website and how we communicate information to the public.</p> <p>According to Scottish Household Survey (2021) 97% of people in the Scottish Borders have household internet access (and therefore access to the Council website). Access to the internet (therefore council website) can also be found in local libraries and community centres.</p>

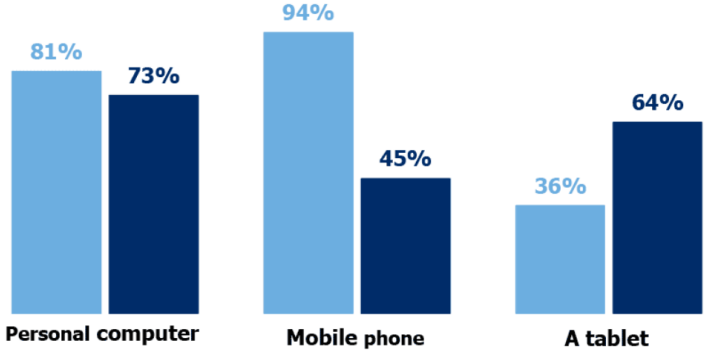
Reasoning:

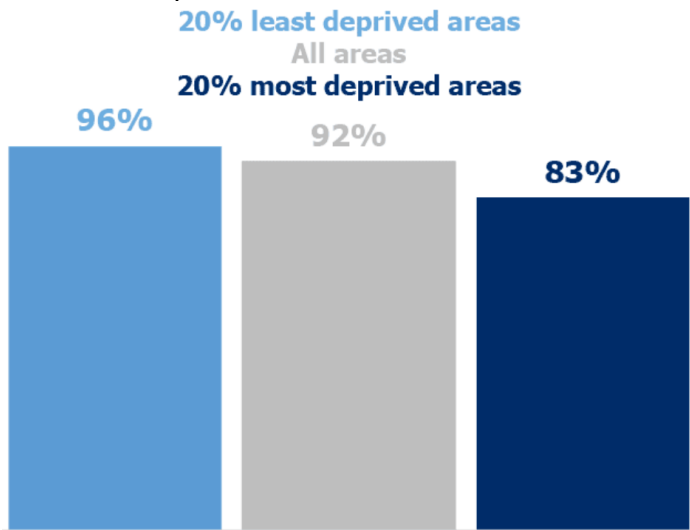

When the website is migrated to the Jadu central platform, it will have more functionality, better security and be designed to facilitate self-service.
