Q2 Community Action Team Report

The following is commentary based on the statistical information provided in the CAT Quarterly Impact Report for quarter 2 of 2024/25.

- On 20th May 2024 the number of CAT officers reduced from two teams to one team. There are now six officers and one sergeant covering the Borders.
- The number of parking tickets issued across the Borders increased slightly in quarter 2, with 126 tickets issued for the quarter. There remains a problem with availability of ticket books from the central ticket office.
- Problems with young people causing issues in Peebles and Innerleithen have remained low in quarter 2 due to increased patrols and active engagement with young people by the CAT and community officers in these locations. This is positive news.
- Problems with young people engaging in antisocial behaviour in Burnfoot resulted in a large increase in reported incidents in July and August. Increased patrols in August and September and the deployment of officers on quad bikes was well received by the Burnfoot Community. SBCAT attended a meeting at Burnfoot Community Hub to find solutions to the issues in Burnfoot. There has been a substantial reduction in reported issues in September but the team will continue to focus on this area in the coming months.

EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

1. In early September an SBCAT officer and the Wildlife Officer patrolled with quad bikes in rural areas across Berwickshire targeting wildlife crime and other rural crimes. Crime prevention advice was given to farmers and rural workers.

EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

1. SBCAT have been attending in Jedburgh on Mondays when the court is due to sit. The mobile and foot patrols have been well received by the public in Jedburgh with officers being thanked on several occasions.

EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

 Within the property SBCAT recovered about £4000 worth of cannabis and 6000 tablets with a similar value. Offensive weapons were also seized.

EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

1. SBCAT conducted patrols in August and deployed the quad bikes. This was well received by the Burnfoot Community. SBCAT attended a meeting at Burnfoot Community Hub to find solutions to the issues in Burnfoot. There has been a substantial reduction in reported issues.

EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

1. Increased patrols and active engagement with young people in Peebles and Innerleithen has seen the number of incidents reported to Police Scotland reduce significantly in recent months and the reduction is being sustained.

All Localities

1. In August SBCAT took part in a motorcycle safety initiative with officers from the Midlothian CAT and Roads Policing, in response to collisions where 3 motorcyclists lost their lives. Static road checks were completed and officers visited locations where motorcyclists congregate. Approximately 120 motorcyclists were spoken to and given safety advice by the SBCAT.

Mobile patrols are those carried out in marked Police Scotland vehicles and can involve 1 or more officers. The figure quoted is in individual officer hours.

Static road checks are proactive stops of vehicles in known problem locations to prevent or detect criminal or antisocial acts involving vehicles.

Where young people aged under 18 are evidenced committing antisocial behaviour (including drinking alcohol) warning letters are issued to parents/guardians to advise them of the situation.
